

Vetting Process

Hello, and welcome to our Dungeon! It's for dungeons and dragons, really... Okay, it's also an informal kinky dungeon. We are not a public venue, and we only choose to let people into our home with whom we can be friends and who will mesh with other attendees. We enjoy a diverse group of friends with different orientations and identities. If we get the sense that will bother you or that you're only interested in immediate sexual gratification, we suggest you look elsewhere. We're friends first.

Read all the **RULES** to make sure you can handle what we've said.

No smoking of any kind is allowed on our property.

Please.don **.send.me.a.message.asking.how.to.get.vetted.when.l **e.laid.this.all.out.so. thoroughly;

You must attend a **public munch or event** to meet us.

If you cannot attend a public event, you cannot attend our private events. No exceptions. You can message either <u>@FunandGames923</u> or <u>@GameMaster923</u> ahead of an event so we know to look out for you. You are responsible for approaching us, though we often introduce ourselves to new attendees.

You can check the calendar in our Events section to see where you can meet us.

What do we assess:

- Are you vaccinated? If not, you can stop now.
- Profile Picture on FetLife: Don't be a dick. We are interested in more than your genitals; show us you have more to offer. Anything else, really. Do not send us a picture of your dick to show us why we want you at our parties. Your cock is not that special.
- About Me on FetLife: If it's empty or excessively short, we'll stop. If I cringe while reading it, I'll stop. Saying you're new when your profile is years old? That's just lazy. If you're discriminatory or inflammatory, we're not interested in bringing negativity into our space.
- Friends: You MUST have a friend of ours who is willing to vouch for you, friends you make through attending public events. If we have anyone in common, we may choose to ask others in the community about you. You are welcome to do the same for us. Telling me how many other groups or people have approved you will not magically change this process. We still need to meet you first.

• Can you hold a conversation? Are you a decent person to hang out with when we meet you? Do we think you'll fit in well with other people who attend?

Some notes:

- Please complete the Google form agreeing to our rules prior to submitting an RSVP request. The only non-FetLife information it REQUIRES is a name by which we can call you and proof of vaccination (you can black out your information). This is per PERSON, not per account, and only needs to be completed once.
- You will never be invited to a play night unless we've met you in public a few times. We may still not approve your request to attend. That's our prerogative.
- You may still NOT get your RSVP accepted to every event that we host. Often, we will be trying to balance certain groups. We host a variety of events that appeal to different people. If you're the type to get mad about this, please see the "No drama" rule.
- Inclusion in a play night does not guarantee that anyone, including the hosts, will scene with you. No one is forced to do anything. That also means there is no expectation that you will do anything.

Event Approval Process

I always try to be very transparent and fair in my policies and procedures. We have a very firm "no drama" rule. Whining at me because I didn't approve a request to an event will violate that rule. I have a system, and I'm trying to balance out the interests of lots of people in the community. Be patient, be considerate, be polite, and be understanding.

Public Events:

Everyone is welcome to attend any public events we host, and you're welcome to bring guests. Those are a great opportunity to get vetted and get to know us for our private events. We attend a lot of community events as well. The rest of this post applies to our request-only, private events for vetted attendees. A brief conversation once will not get you on the list for private events. Get to know us, let us get to know you.

Private Events:

To make balancing events easier, private parties will often have more targeted interests. All of our standard rules will apply, and everything else will still be available. However, when we accept RSVPs, we'll be looking more at people who will fit into certain interest groups. Unless the specific event states otherwise, I typically accept between 25-30 people (up to 40 if there is an outdoor component during summer). Please be courteous about the

waitlist/vetting or you'll never have to worry about it again. We take a lot of factors into account when building a group that we think will work well for specific events.

How do I choose who gets approved?

You will be rejected for: not vetted, known red flags, discriminatory/inflammatory/insulting profiles, dick pic avatars, no show previously (you held a spot when someone else could have attended), or selfish parking decisions that made others unable to attend. I keep a blacklist (available on request) and a "time-out" list (private). If I think you simply don't fit the tone of the event, I'll try to redirect you to one that suits you better.

Partners linked on our profiles and trusted monitors will always be approved regardless of the event being marked full, a wait list, or their attendance at the previous event. This is a very finite, specific list with long friendships attached, and their partners are often included as a courtesy. As a general statement, playing with us does not increase the likelihood of us accepting your RSVP. These are the people who help us make the events happen. Be grateful for their help, not upset that they get to skip the line. (They aren't skipping the line; this is where that wiggle room in my numbers figures in.)

After those, I look at did you attend the last event, are you coming to the munch/dance that precedes this, who RSVPed first, who is partners with whom, what interests people have, carpool groups, etc. You won't be able to attend every event. Part of why I post my events so far ahead is to give you a heads up about which events you might prefer rather than coming to one and having the next one be something where you might have enjoyed yourself more.

If you get approved and your partners and carpool buddies are still on the wait list, please let me know so I can take that into consideration when I finish out the list. If your partner has not yet requested, please have them do so. I will not assume they're coming just because you are. If I don't approve them, they can't attend.

If you select "Interested" for a private event, I will leave you on the wait list. Once you decide if you're able to attend, you can change your RSVP for potential approval for the event. Otherwise, I'll treat it like you're just bookmarking it.

Sometimes, I will approve "Interested," but do be cognizant of taking a space from someone else. Do not ask to attend if you aren't sure you plan to be there.

How do I use the wait list?

As much as I adore you all and wish I could have every one of our friends at all of our events, we just don't have the capacity. That's where the wait list comes in.

 I approve in waves, not always all at once or immediately. There are multiple reasons for this that have nothing to do with whether or not you are accepted. You might be "on the wait list" even if the event isn't full because I'm working on balancing or spreading out the notifications so the event hits people's feeds at different times.

- All requests to attend are left on the wait list unless specifically rejected.
- If you cannot attend, please update your RSVP so I can approve someone from the wait list.
- When I know the event is getting full, I will offer priority on the next event to those still left on the wait list.
- Leave yourselves on the wait list if you still want to attend; we do update for cancellations. If you can't attend, remove yourself from the wait list. Leaving yourself on the list to get priority on the next list isn't helpful.

If you know you cannot attend, please remove your RSVP. If you are still on the list the day of the event and don't show, you are taking a spot from someone else, and we remember that when making future lists.
